under the title of A Table Alphabeticall. R. Cawdrey concentrated on "scholarly" words. In the 17th century, with printing well
established, the first real English dictionary of importance appeared. It was John Kersey who was the first to attempt a universal
dictionary of the language. LEXICOGRAPHY. The theory and practice of compiling dictionaries is called lexicography. The history of
compiling dictionaries for English comes as far back as the Old English period, where we can find glosses of religious books / interlinear
translations from Latin into English/. Regular bilingual dictionaries began to appear in. the 15-th century /Anglo-Latin, Anglo-French ,
Anglo-German/. The first unilingual dictionary explaining difficult words appeared in 1604, the author was Robert Cawdry, a

Introduction. Theory and practice. A dictionary of lexicography? A dictionary of dictionary-making? Indeed, "lexicography" is commonly understood in a narrow sense as the theory and practice, or the "art and craft" (Landau 1984), of dictionary-making, the compilation and preparation of reference texts for publication. However, in the latter half of this century, the importance of a second strand to the discipline, namely the scholarly field of dictionary research, has become increasingly recognised.

1.3 The terminology of lexicography Lexicographic theories, methods and products developed considerably during the last decades of the twentieth century. However, the terminology of lexicography did not develop with equal speed and was initially insufficient and unsystematic. There were hardly any specialized dictionaries of lexicographic terminology available, and in linguistic reference works lexicographic terms were included only in so far as they were relevant from a general-linguistics point of view. This state of affairs caused problems of communication for both the theoretical and the

Many aspects have still to be analysed, new problems and challenges are continuously appearing, and solutions have to be found to all of them, the new as well as the old.
