

Our grandmother was Irene Mary Wrightstone, who married Edwin Charles Klinger. Irene's Wrightstone grandparents were Michael Wrightstone and his wife Eliza Kline. Michael was the son of John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart.

Irene was born in 1905, so it's unlikely she would have remembered Michael Wrightstone or his wife Eliza Kline.

John Wrightstone (1791 – 1856)

John Wrightstone was born 1791¹ in Pennsylvania to Jacob and Elizabeth Wrightstone. About 1820, John married Margaret Hart,² who was born about 1800 in Pennsylvania to Michael and Barbara Hart.

- Michael Hart was born about 1778 in York County Pennsylvania, and died on September 12th 1811 in York County Pennsylvania. Michael Hart's parents were Jacob Hart born about 1720 in Germany, and died about 1811 in York County Pennsylvania. Jacob married Catherine Landis.³

John was a farmer and laborer, who owned his own homes and other lands. Around 1820 John and Margaret lived in Fairview Township York County. Prior to 1840 the family moved to Newberry Township York County.

By 1844 the family moved to Conewago Township York County where Margaret died sometime between August 4th 1845 and January 15th 1846.⁴

John then married Leah,⁵ who may have been previously married to Joseph Sipe (Seip),⁶ who died about 1848.

- Based on research, this Leah is either Leah Sipe who after her husband Joseph Sipe died, married John, or Leah is the sister of John Wrightstone, who married Joseph Sipe.⁷ Sister or wife of Joseph, this Leah would have been born circa 1801, and we cannot locate her after 1860. A number of children show up on the 1850 and 1860 census record who I believe are children belonging to Leah and her first husband Joseph Sipe.⁸

There were civil charges of assault and battery brought against John, which happened after Margaret died.

- "...1851 November Court Session - County vs. John Wrightstone – Indictment assault and battery – true bill fined November 21st 1851. Tuesday defendant & Francis Werly as security \$200 for appearances of defendants at January Session 1/5/52 to answerJohn Baker, Wm Eichiltz, Susanna Seip – Tuesday November 4th 1851 – Each in \$100.00..." "... 1852 January Court Session - Tried January 8th 1852. The attached January 1852 Court Docket for the 8th shows Conewago, John Wrightstone..."⁹

Since 1821 Margaret and John were having children about every two years. The one exception is between when Samuel Wrightstone was born in 1838 and Margaret in 1843. From what I can tell Margaret was the last child born to John and Margaret, and Margaret may have died resulting from giving birth to another child in 1846.

When John died in 1856, his estate record indicated: "...decedent left a widow and eight children..." meaning those children still living in 1856. Using census records, we believe John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart had the following children. ¹⁰

- i. Elizabeth Wrightstone was born about 1821 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart in Fairview Township York County Pennsylvania. She married George Witmer (Whitmore or Witmyer) on September 26th 1844. ¹¹ Elizabeth was named after her father's mother or for her mother, ¹² and she died about 1874, near or after her son Ephraim Witmer was born.
- ii. Unknown male child in the 1830 census who was born between 1820 and 1825 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. I cannot locate another male Wrightstone, that isn't already accounted for. This child may have died prior to 1840.
- iii. Michael Wrightstone was born on October 3rd 1825 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. He married Eliza Jane Kline ¹³
- iv. Sarah Ann Wrightstone ¹⁴ was born August 30th 1827 ¹⁵ to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. In 1850 Sara Ann Richstone, age 23, lived in the household of John Becker, Conewago Township York County Pennsylvania. ¹⁶

Sarah Rightstone married Daniel S. Strine on August 18th 1853 in Conewago Township York County PA by F. Shetter J.P. ¹⁷ Daniel was born May 4th 1833 to John Strine and Catharine Schultz in Strinestown, York County Pennsylvania. ¹⁸

Daniel and Sarah lived in the Manchester area of York County. Daniel died February 12th 1886, and Sarah died December 1st 1909. They were both laid to rest in the Manchester Union Cemetery in Manchester York County Pennsylvania. ¹⁹

- v. John Wrightstone was born September 19th 1830 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. He married Eliza Wire. ²⁰ Elizabeth Wire is a family member of John's younger sister Barbara Ann, who married John F. Wire.
- vi. Unknown male child was listed in the 1840 census record for Newberry Township, who would have been born between 1830 and 1835; most likely about 1832 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. This child may have died before 1850 census record.
- vii. Jane Wrightstone was born 1835 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. Jane may have married John M. Wilt of Conewago Twp. These names appeared on the Estate records of John Wrightstone; John M. Wilt of Conewago Township, Joseph McCreary of Newberry Twp, John W. Witmer Esq. of York, Elijah Ganetson and Israel Garetson both of Spring Garden Twp.
- viii. Samuel Wrightstone ²¹ was born 1841 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. Samuel died of dysentery on August 29th 1864 at the Andersonville Prison. ²²
- ix. Margaret Ellen Wrightstone was born about 1843-44 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. In 1860 she was 17 years old working as a servant maid in the home of Squire George Bowers, age 73, and Eve Bowers age 67, Strinestown, Conewago Twp. York County Pennsylvania. ²³

- x. Barbara Ann Wrightstone was born May 27th 1849²⁴ John Wrightstone and Leah Sipe in Conewago Township York County Pennsylvania. When Barbara was 19 years old, she married 21 year old John F. Wire (Weir) on September 6th 1868 in Strinestown Conewago Township York County Pennsylvania.²⁵

John was born June 15th 1846 to David Wire and Elizabeth Fink, most likely in the Strinestown area of Conewago Township York County Pennsylvania. Before the start of the Civil war John stood at 5' 4" tall with black hair and brown eyes. He worked as a laborer in and around the Strinestown area.

On August 18th 1864, John Wire enlisted into federal service in Harrisburg Pennsylvania. On August 23rd in Harrisburg, he mustered in as a private with Co. B, 200th Pennsylvania Infantry. John was honorably discharged with his company May 3th 1865. At this time he moved to Lisburn in Fairview Township Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. It was here that he and Barbara would raise their family and live out their lives.²⁶

We aren't certain when Barbara died, but John died December 27th 1909 while living in Lisburn Fairview Township York County Pennsylvania. They were both laid to rest in the Mount Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church and Cemetery, Cedar Point York County Pennsylvania.²⁷

John and Barbara had five children.

- a. Frank G. Wire was born October 10th 1868
- b. Charles Eli Wire was born October 18th 1870
- c. Elizabeth Ann "Lizzie" Wire was born October 16th 1872
- d. David F. Wire was born May 6th 1875
- e. Leroy Wire was born December 31st 1885.

Samuel Wrightstone (1841-1864)

Samuel Wrightstone was born 1841 to John Wrightstone and Margaret Hart. In 1850 he lived with the family in Conewago Township York County Pennsylvania. By 1860 Samuel would live about a mile from his brother's John and Michael, in the Monaghan Township, Lewisberry Area of York County. Samuel lived in the home of J. Myers and his wife Rachael, working as a farm laborer.

On September 10th 1862, a 21 year old Samuel Ritston (Wrightstone),²⁸ went to the 2nd ward in Harrisburg Dauphin County, and was enrolled into federal service by Captain Gowan. Samuel was assigned to Gowan's Calvary Company. On September 17th 1862, Samuel was mustered in for a 3 year term of service by Captain Norton, and assigned to Company E of the 18th Regiment, Pennsylvania Cavalry (163rd Volunteers).²⁹

After some brief training, Samuel and his 18th regiment where on duty at Bladensburg and Germantown Pennsylvania and in the Defenses of Washington till June 1863. The 18th was then quickly dispatched to Chantilly Virginia, and became involved in a number of skirmishes. The 18th continued duties throughout northern Virginia and Maryland, engaging in the campaigns known as the Battle of Antietam and the South the Battle of Sharpsburg.

During the Battle of Gettysburg, General Meade commanded the Union Army of the Potomac, his commanders deployed troops to protect Union flanks, and to look for Confederate activity. During this time the 18th Pennsylvania Cavalry was attached to the 1st Brigade, 3rd Division Cavalry Corps. On June 30th 1863, about noon, the 18th were 13 miles east of Gettysburg, in Hanover, where they engaged Confederate forces of Major General Stuart's Cavalry and Horse Artillery.

After the Confederate forces were forced to withdraw from Hanover, the 18th moved north towards Hunterstown. In the early afternoon of July 2nd, the 18th arrived on the field of Gettysburg, and quickly moved over the road from Gettysburg to Abbottstown, where they were attacked at sundown near Hunterstown by Stuart's Cavalry which was driven from the field after an engagement of two hours.

During the late afternoon of July 3rd, the 18th charged with the 1st brigade upon the Confederate's infantry's right and rear positions; behind the stone wall to the north on the outer edge of the woods of Bushman Hill towards Emmitsburg Road. ³⁰After the battle, the 18th moved into the town of Emmitsburg Maryland.

On November 18th 1863, while the Regiment where on duties at Germania Ford Virginia, Samuel was captured in an attack by Confederate forces. ³¹ He was taken as a prisoner of war, ³²and sent to the Andersonville Prison, also known as Camp Sumter. ³³

On August 29th 1864 Samuel died of dysentery, and is buried at the Andersonville National Cemetery, Plot: Section: E, Row: 7245. ³⁴

- John Sipe who was born about 1838. Some researchers think this is a Wrightstone.
- George S. Sipe who was born May 5th 1837, and died April 8th 1907 while living in Conewago Township York County, Pennsylvania. George was a farmer and carpenter. George was buried April 10th 1907 at Bald Hill, near Newberrytown, York County. George married Catharine Billet who was born on December 25th 1838 to the parents of George Billet and Susan Palmer. Catherine died on October 6th 1925, probably in Jackson Township York County. She is buried at Bald Hill, Emey, Newberry Township, York County. Catherine's father George was born about 1814. Her mother Susan was born on May 25th 1813, and died on August 19th 1902. She is buried at the Ironville United Brethren Church Cemetery York County.
- Joseph Sipe who was born about 1842, but no Joseph Wrightstone can be located in any other record, except the 1860 census record.

More than 12,000 prisoners died at Andersonville and are buried in the National Cemetery on the grounds. It is still an active military cemetery. The site of the prison is now the Andersonville National Historic Site which is part of the U S. National Park Service. The Park's museum serves as a memorial to all American prisoners of war.
