At Lampton we've had a big push on academic literacy, and I'm part of the working group. Each department is implementing strategies for developing subject-specific literacy. In science, we're focusing on the process of reading information and then distilling it to scaffold a succinct paragraph of writing. With my year 7 class we're reading the Horrible Science books and then writing a review. Teaching students from many cultures is no different to teaching in a school with a single culture - with the exception being having to pay additional attention to language/literacy. You can make a difference in their lives by rethinking how you look at social class and extending to all children the same opportunities to share their experiences through reading, speaking, and writing.
