I particularly like the fact that Dr Stefanovic is able to use his knowledge of Greek - but, more than a knowledge of Greek, an understanding of Greek idiom - to infuse the text with heightened meaning. It is good to watch some of the You Tube videos of Ranko Stefanovic lectures, to be imbued with his passion for Jesus as revealed in this final book of the Bible. He knows that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever, and He changes not. He knows that a whole lot more than do ninety percent of the theologians. But the Book of Revelation shows how that the antichrist spirit would come into the church and defile it, making it lukewarm, formal and powerless. It exposes Satan, revealing his works (attempted destruction of God's people and the discrediting of God's word) right down to the time he is cast into the lake of fire. Christ Promised. Old Testament saints were not simply tiles in a mosaic, witnessing, unwittingly, to a gospel pattern of which they were ignorant. They too looked forward to the fulfillment of these patterns. How? It's certainly true that there are patterns to spot in the Old Testament. Gospel imagery was built up over centuries, layer upon layer. Jesus really is the true temple, lamb, priest, king, and prophet.
